Approaching the Altar of My God

[based on Psalm 42/43]

Introductory Notes

In Psalm 42/43 the Psalmist speaks of his anxious soul that is disturbed and would retreat rather than encounter the Lord God who is most worthy. He is assailed with doubts and confusions. His resolve is weak. Yet the Psalmist has heard God's call, and the deep longing of his heart is to hurry to worship the God he knows loves him.

And so the Psalm oscillates between a confident approach and a doubting retreat. This shows itself in a kind of liturgical stammer, a conflicted hesitation that is not readily resolved.

If we are honest with ourselves, we often find ourselves in a similar position of hesitation as we enter into worship, though the reasons may be different. It is not likely that we have had to endure the overt taunts of scoffers. But we continually encounter the strident claims of a host of authorities that court our attention and our allegiance. We become confused as we face situations in which the obedient response is not always clear. And we are sometimes properly daunted by our unworthiness to approach the living God and awed by his glory and holiness.

Approaching the Altar of My God is a choral reading that begins the worship service and is meant to serve as a transition zone from our workaday world to a time of worship before our God. It gives voice to the uncertainties we feel, to our doubts and confusions. It disarms us of the presumptive familiarity with God we are prone to fall into. It reminds us of the huge distance between us a frail creatures and our creator God in his glory and righteousness that we can never bridge on our own. And it also reminds us of our longing and need for God.

But it is God who has called us. We hesitate but proceed in the confidence buoyed up by God's call and offer of grace.

The three readers may be positioned at the front or the back of the sanctuary, or perhaps more effectively, standing in the congregation.
